Another big addition

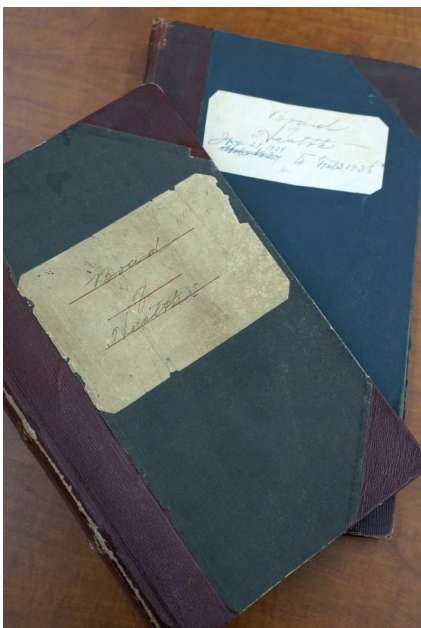
When office moves happen, historical records often turn up and get transferred to the Archives. October was a busy month in this respect, with a large space in one of the City of Belleville's buildings being emptied of some older City records. This led to two busy days in the Archives, as 200 boxes and volumes were transferred into the vaults, taking up 60 shelves!

Most of the records were City of Belleville Council Minutes and Assessment Rolls from the 1950s to the early 2000s, but there were also some other types of records in the mix, including two minute books of the local Board of Health, covering 1924 to 1949.

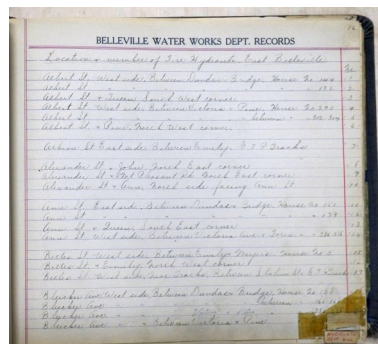


CABHC: 2017-93 City of Belleville Council Minutes, 1958-1998

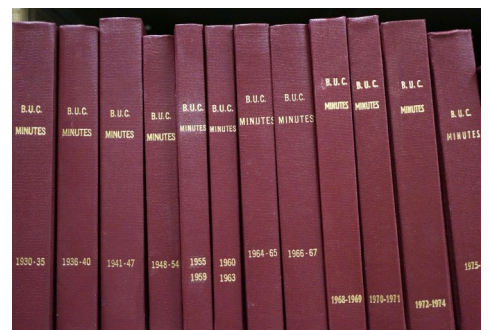

What's in the Display Case?

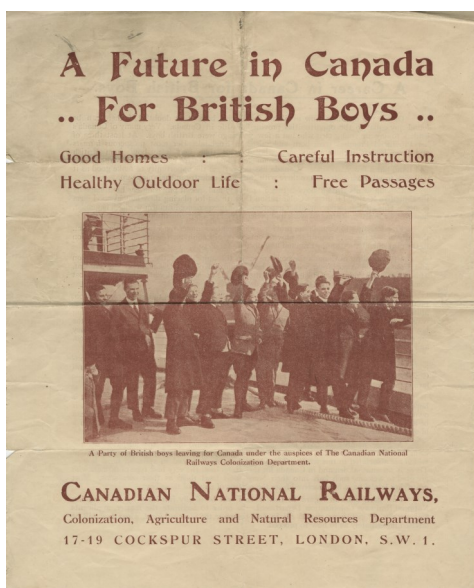
To mark the first home game in Belleville of the Belleville Senators, this month our display case features hockey teams and hockey venues from around Hastings County.

Railway immigrants

In the mid-1920s Canada's immigration was run by the railway companies. A recent visitor from England brought in this CN poster, which advertised the British Immigration and Colonization Association scheme under which his father came to work in Canada when he was 15 years old. The poster, printed by CN Rail, offered British boys "Good Homes, Careful Instruction, Free Passage and a Healthy Outdoor Life."
